The Board suggested lowering age objective and formally revisiting the plan after three years of implementation.

Chairman Albrecht proposed discussing specific elements of the proposed plan.

The Board noted that there appeared to be a lot of public support for the plan.

The Board asked about the wording about domestic cattle and brucellosis in the plan.

The Board noted the potential impacts of a formal mid-plan review or reviews.

The Board voiced concern about if, or how, spike hunts impact limited entry units.

The Board asked what the elk committee's discussion was about the split archery and either sex archery hunts.

The Board suggested that potentially some general season rifle hunt permits could be allocated to archers, asked about any sex permit allocation, discussed the use of preference points, and discussed the impacts of a bull and/or a cow permit versus an any sex permit.

The Board asked how many LOAs are being dissolved, about multi season permit crowding survey results, about a presumed change in the demographic of the multi season customer, and suggested eliminating the multi season permit.

The Board discussed the Paunsaugunt becoming a general season unit, suggested not having an archery hunt on that unit, talked about how sometimes wildlife management public process safeguards and protects certain hunting opportunities over others, and voiced concern about conflict and crowding.

The Board proposed entertaining an antler point restriction, asked if any of Utah's neighboring states have antler restrictions on any bull units, and discussed the impact an antler point restriction might have.

Chairman Albrecht clarified his opinion on an antler point restriction.

Wade Heaton declared no conflict of interest on this agenda item. Bret Selman also declared no conflict of interest on this agenda item.

The Board voiced dissent for approving the Sweetwater application, and also brought up that there are CWMUs that do not meet minimums, but whose property greatly benefits wildlife. The Board suggested that the CWMU advisory committee should be able to consider applications that do not meet minimum acreage requirements as stated in rule. The Board voiced that one role of the board is to be able to make judgments on proposed exceptions to rule.

Chairman Albrecht advocated for being consistent with the rule, and Vice-Chairman Dearth suggested putting language in the rule that would allow for exceptions based on the value of the land to wildlife.

The Board commented that the CWMU advisory committee has been meeting for long enough that they are experts on the issues being voted on, and that desirable elk are being killed on the Sweetwater property because of depredation, and because the land is not a CWMU. The Board stressed the need for incentivizing landowners.

The Board asked about proposed trade lands. The Board discussed public land parcels within CWMU boundaries, and asked how much of the trade lands would benefit wildlife.

The Board commented on the value of the committee's recommendations, and the Board asked how many elk had been harvested in the past 8 years due to depredation issues.

Assistant Attorney General Kyle input was asked if he had an internal legal advice on this issue.

Chairman Albrecht asked Karl Hirst what his stance was behind his motion.

The Board asked about the Division's recommendations for Jacob's Creek, Lazy H, Grass Valley and Ingham Peak.

The Board asked when the CWMU rule would be up for revision.

Great Salt Lake - Many waterfowl and eared grebes have left the lake with marshes freezing. Salinity is extremely high (>19%). Brine shrimp harvest has exceed 15 million pounds.

Waterfowl - Swan season closed on Nov. 17. Fourth year in a row. Season closed earlier this year. DWR working on recommendations for RAC and board consideration.

Administration - New Fishing Guidebooks have arrived. Cougar and bobcat checks continue, Contractor bid meeting for remodel Dec. 6, 2022.

RAC Member Opportunities – Post-season deer classifications, big game aerial captures.

Randy Hutchison - Believe 2,750 swan tags were issued. Trumpeter quota was doubled this year. Still closed even faster than before. 2,700 hunters got 12 days to take advantage of the hunt. It's unacceptable that this is happening. No one cares about waiting five years. A trumpeter swan is a trophy of a lifetime for a waterfowler. It's unacceptable, and people are losing opportunities to hunt because of the people out there gaming the system. I know the board will make recommendations, I'm assuming in April?

Ben Nadolski - Probably in May. Due to the guidebook cycle, we need to have everything buttoned up by June.

Randy Hutchison - Do you know if we have enough numbers back yet to know how many people were affected by the early closure?

Ben Nadolski - Have numbers, but I don't want to swear by that. Swans are not on the agenda tonight, so I want to be really careful that we are respectful of the rules we're under. A total of 2,750 permits were issued, and somewhere close to 800 swans were harvested this year.

Randy Hutchison - Talking points for the board and the Division. Think if you harvest a trumpeter swan, people should lose their waterfowl hunting privileges for that year and the following year. People are targeting trumpeters. It's not acceptable. Possibly consider changing boundary lines on some swan hunts in the future. If that is the case, go back to the old boundary line. If that's the recommendation that's put forward, under no circumstances should private hunting clubs be included. They shouldn't get special treatment.

Justin Oliver - You're not alone. The swan hunt has now closed early for four years in a row. I don't know what we do or what it will take for people to sense the urgency. I don't feel like a sense of urgency has been there. I don't know if the Division senses that. I know a lot has to be done federally for changes to happen. But something has to be done to put some sense of urgency in this. We keep getting the same results. Take it seriously. We are getting a lot of calls.

Ben Nadolski - Waterfowl rules are on a 3-year cycle. That does not preclude us from coming in mid-cycle and making adjustments. In terms of urgency, we are right there with you. I have already heard a number of new ideas being thrown out. We just need to let the process take place in the spring. The federal process is a multi-year process. Research needs to be done to determine where the trumpeters are coming from and what the impact to the trumpeter population really is.

Justin Oliver - We knew it was going to take a while. So now here we are, four years into the process. Hopefully it gets expedited. That's what we're hoping for.

Ben Nadolski - We're just over one year into the five-year waiting period, and it's not working. We have to go farther.

- When you translocated, how do you determine that? Do you give the public notice? Does the county commissioners have a say in where they are translocated?
- Translocated sites make zero to no sense to her. High points in the middle of sagebrush bordering the county line. Prairie Dogs have come

down the canyon and into Minersville in the last 10-30 years. Seems like there needs to be planning and coordinating with people on the ground sites and in the area where they are being translocated.

Kevin Bunnell:

 Hopes that we have learned and have a better process than we did 10-30 years ago. Feels we are better now. Several specific requirements that need to be met.

Gene Boardman:

- Would like to know more about where Division of Wildlife Services begins to manage and where the Utah Wildlife begins and ends on the situation we have right now. Who captures the Prairie Dogs and relocates them?
- If they are delisted, will they become the State's responsibility?
- What happens when an endangered Prairie Dog is attacked by an endangered predator?

Kevin Bunnell:

 DWR is doing the work right now and will continue to do the work whether or not they are delisted. DWR does the work under the U.S. Fish and Wildlife. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife sets the rules on where and when and the DWR does it. Once they're delisted, the DWR will continue to do the work, but will be setting the rules on where and when, through the public process.

Kevin Bunnell (Online Public Comments): Received one comment. It was in support of the plan.

Reed Erickson: Iron County and Special Services Coordinator: Appreciates the opportunity to comment and share a few thoughts. He read a letter from the Iron County Commissioners. (Please see attached letter dated November 29, 2022). Pleased with the steps to delist the Utah Prairie Dog, this is the right step. Supports the DWR's proposal to delist.

Kevin Bunnell: DWR presented the strategy to Iron and Garfield County commissioners separately. They both indicated a desire to sign the MOA, that Kim referenced, as partners. He is on the Agenda to present the plan to Beaver County later this month. It is anticipated that they will be willing to sign the MOA

Craig Laub: Happy this day has finally come. It was a relief when the State took over the control of the Prairie Dogs and landowners were able to work with the DWR.

Gene Boardman: Surprised things have gone so well over the past few years based on the animosity that existed years ago. Appreciates DWR's efforts to get things squared around. Believes the plan is a good one and it looks like a good future for Prairie Dogs and the public that deals with them.

Dan Fletcher: Echoes what Chuck said about the partnership between the State and Federal government, local and county governments. Some of the people that are overlooked are grazing permittees. When the translocation occurs from private land to public land it impacts someone's allotment. A lot of trust has been established between grazing permittees beyond the Forest Service. Beaver County doesn't want the Iron County issues with Prairie Dogs. It's been a nightmare with the Townsend Ground Squirrels. Appreciates work and effort that has gone into the plan.

Is it a GIS map survey? Would you explain the mandatory orientation course? Is that just so they don't take females or so they can see the difference? The permit doesn't say male or female? It is just discouraged to take females? Is 18% a general? Or what is the male to female ratio in our Utah population?

Craig Laub:

 Ranchers are losing calves and/or sheep to bear. Are there any multipliers? If you've lost one, you've probably lost three or four.

Kevin Bunnell:

• The reason it wasn't discussed is because there's a whole different policy that deals with depredation and how we compensate people. It wouldn't happen under this rule, it would happen under other rules and policy that specifically deal with that issue.

Gene Boardman:

- The bait season will run from May 30 to the end of June. Doesn't the quality of the Bear hide diminish quite a bit by Fall?
- A year ago or so, some people were upset and thought predators would decimate the deer herd due to the drought. They made a push to liberalize the take of Bear and Cougar. From what he saw in the presentation, there were fewer Bear harvested last year than in previous years?
- Any information on Bears as far as their kill of deer?

Kevin Bunnell:

- Explained that Bears usually have a bigger impact on Elk/calves herds.
 Elk group together and have Nursey herds. Deer disperse when they have their fawns. Therefore, Deer are less of an issue with regard to Bears.
- Bear will consume the whole Sheep/Lamb, so there's no evidence left behind.

Chuck Chamberlain:

How many are they missing when they are looking at depredation?

	Tammy Pearson : Reiterates what both Scott and Craig said. She hears a lot in the Legislative Session from producers about Bear and Cougars and depredation. Appreciates DWR getting permits in producers hands to shoot the Bears and/or Lions due to depredation issues. We need everyone on the same team.
	Austin Atkinson: Appreciates some of the changes. Some of the constituents like the changes to the bait regulations, such as bait restrictions and the introduction of barrel use. Seems like we are making this more complicated with terminology that may be unfamiliar to new hunters. Hopes we can all keep this in mind and make the process even easier next time. How would this work for a Spot and Stalk, like an Over The County tag you purchase? Is this a certification or verification that you would carry with you? Would I not get my tag until I've taken the course?
	Brayden Richmond : He has been pretty vocal about making Bear hunting and registering bait sites "simplier". Believes the plan is less complicated, but could be better.
	Chuck Chamberlain: Feels bad the Forest Service representative wasn't consultation with sooner. Concerned barrels will be left in the forest and increasing the amount of trash left on the mountain. Expressed concern about accountability and that bait sites will be too close to campgrounds and where human are. Liability issues.
	Kevin Bunnell: If the Forest Service finds a barrel left on a registered bait site, we can trace it back and cite the hunter.
	Gene Boardman: A couple more questions. Spot and Stalk tags. Are you increasing those? Is there a plan to increase permits? If you have a Spot and Stalk you can't pair up with a Houndsman? When he drew his Bear permit, he

could hunt with or without hounds. With Spot and Stalk the hunter will take the first bear they see, Boar or Sow, it's a once in a lifetime for them.

Brayden Richmond: We talked about the orientation, but the Central Region talked about something we haven't. Once you draw a tag, you take the course and keep it on your person, similar to the Antler Gathering Course. You only take it once you draw a tag. Feels this is reasonable and would like to look at this option. With regard to baiting, there is a lot of information showing you'll have a cleaner bait site and use less food with a barrel. There's really no advantage to leaving your barrel at the site. Not concerned with hunters leaving the barrels behind – just a cleaner site.

Chuck Chamberlain: Will the Bear bait barrels be labeled?

Brayden Richmond: Not only do you have to register on line, you have to post signage at your bait site with your COR number on it.

Gene Boardman: Doesn't see how beneficial it is to take an orientation course. Spot and Stalk hunters will take a Bear no matter what. Bait hunters will be selective depending on how many bears are hitting on their site. The Houndsman are very discriminating on the Bears they take.

Brayden Richmond: Doesn't see the downside of taking an orientation course. We want to encourage harvesting male Bears and discourage the taking of females. By requiring a course, it helps with the public's perception of hunters and shows we are trying.

Verland King: Not a Houndsman, but a hunter will most likely take a big Bear despite the sex. Doesn't have a problem with taking an educational course, but doesn't think it's that big of a deal.



RE: Comments - Utah Prairie Dog Conservation Strategy Proposal to Delist

Since the Utah prairie dog (UPD) was listed under the Threatened and Endangered Species Act (ACT) in 1973, Iron County has worked with the various partners, (DWR, USFWS, BLM, Forest Service, municipalities, private landowners, developers, adjacent counties, etc.) to manage UPD populations through numerous planning mediums. Most of the early efforts were very contentious at best, however, over the year's attitudes have changed and become more progressive and cooperative as new ideas were fleshed out to reach the long-term goal of delisting.

One of the major components of delisting is the requirement to have a plan in place to manage UPDs once they are delisted. The Utah Prairie Dog Conservation Strategy Plan (UPDCSP) provides for post-delisting management. It utilizes the vast amount of data collected over the years to better understand the impacts of past and current development, habitat needs, translocation management strategies, and disease control. It also provides assurances to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) that management goals will be met through annual monitoring, and sets the stage for DWR management at the local and State level.

Iron County has been a partner from the start and over the years have purchased four properties (over 800 acres) that, through easements, are dedicated and managed for UPD habitat. We represent development, agriculture, and landowners in the county to minimize impacts of UPDs on the local economy, while providing adequate protection to the UPDs. Iron County agrees with the DRW proposal to institute the UPDCSP once delisting occurs, and through this plan we can finally see the light at the

end of the tunnel – so to speak – to remove the UPD from the ACT. We wholeheartedly support the DRW's proposal to implement the UPDCSP once delisting occurs.

Beaver County, Utah, respectfully submits the following comments on the Utah Prairie Dog Conservation Strategy proposed by the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources:

The delisting of Utah Prairie Dogs is a high priority in order to remove them from the Federal protections of the Endangered Species Act (ESA). Once delisted, these animals will be managed solely by the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources under the proposed Conservation Strategy rather than by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The objectives in this strategy are to continue to maintain healthy populations of prairie dogs throughout the species range. The goal of having the prairie dogs delisted and under state management is something we all want and something that Beaver County fully supports.

Within the Utah Prairie Dog Conservation Strategy, we find that a primary strategy for maintaining populations is through translocation efforts. Prairie dogs located on privately owned lands, whether residential areas or cultivated crop lands should be moved to locations on public lands where they can live unmolested. Prairie dogs are a nuisance animal when they are found on private lands such as residential areas, parks, cemeteries, golf courses, cultivated crop ground, etc. These animals need to be removed and relocated to public land far away from developed private lands where their existence is not intrusive into the human environment.

Our concern over the Conservation Strategy and efforts to translocate prairie dogs lies in the fact that there are limited potential habitat locations available and many of the proposed sites are within several miles of existing agricultural lands. As prairie dog habitat is crowded out by human development and expansion, they are left with less and less desirable habitat options. This habitat loss is the reason for their tenuous existence and the ESA listing. The remaining locations on public lands to relocate prairie dogs are often less than ideal and good locations are becoming harder to find. Many of the sites that have been chosen are not far from developed private land. We have seen how they can and will travel several miles to reach agricultural fields. We are very

wary of any proposed translocations into or near our county which may lead to the establishment of new prairie dog colonies where they are not wanted.

Beaver County adopted a County Resource Management Plan (CRMP) through ordinance on June 6, 2017. This CRMP incorporates the previous Prairie Dog Management plans of Beaver County adopted by Ordinance 2015-13, which was passed on September 14, 2015.

Within this plan, we acknowledge the habitat located in the southern end of Pine Valley as the only historically known and documented habitat for Utah Prairie Dogs within Beaver County. The plan further emphasizes that Beaver County is opposed to any efforts to transplant prairie dogs anywhere else in the county. Any agency desiring to translocate prairie dogs into or within Beaver County must have the consent and approval of the Board of County Commissioners of Beaver County. Beaver County Resource Management Plan (2017) Section 9.3.1.

The Utah Prairie Dog Translocation EA developed by the BLM in March of 2020, in coordination with the Division of Wildlife Resources, identifies multiple sites for prairie dog transplants along the Iron/Beaver county line. We acknowledge the fact that these locations, as currently shown on the proposed maps, are outside the borders of Beaver County. However, we are opposed to many of these sites on the basis of their proximity to the county line and the likelihood of transplanted prairie dogs migrating into Beaver County.

Within the Utah Prairie Dog Translocation EA, and shown on the *appendix A* map, prairie dog management areas within the Minersville No. 1, Minersville No. 3, Minersville No. 5, Stewart and Bald Hills allotments are within a very short distance of Beaver County. The dry, rough rocky ground in these locations will inevitably lead to prairie dogs dispersing to the irrigated fields in and around Minersville. When summer heat dries up the native grasses and forbs, prairie dogs will seek out the succulent green crops that are nearby and will unquestionably disperse miles to get to these crop locations. It is our contention that this will happen with the proposed translocation sites identified above.

We fully understand the need to translocate prairie dogs away from residential and developed areas around Cedar City and Enoch to undisturbed locations on BLM administered lands. We fully support the effort to delist the Utah Prairie Dog as a threatened/endangered species. We recognize the need to translocate colonies to new public land locations in order to maintain the prairie dog population goals that will enable it to be delisted. We understand that there are limited habitat locations available that will support new colonies in the quest to bolster their numbers and ensure their survival. However, we also need to be very careful in protecting the citizens of Beaver County from the consequences of prairie dogs entering and establishing in our county.

For these reasons, we support the efforts to delist the Utah Prairie Dog from threatened species status and return management responsibilities to the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources. We support the Utah Conservation Strategy as a means to this end. However, we also need to be staunch in our stand as to where these animals are allowed to be located and established.

Since the Utah prairie dog was listed in 1973, State and federal agencies (including the Bureau of Land Management), along with local governments, nonprofit organizations and private landowners have worked together to protect, conserve, and restore populations of the Utah prairie dog. Decades of work, research, funding, and collaboration have gone toward the stabilization and recovery of this species. Because of these recovery efforts, Utah prairie dog populations have grown and are shown to be stable. The Utah Prairie Dog Conservation Strategy establishes the goals and objectives and an adaptive framework plan to implement conservation and management of the species for the foreseeable future regardless of listing status. The Color Country and Paria River Districts of the Bureau of Land Management support the Utah Prairie Dog Conservation Strategy.



ACTION ITEM 2: Utah Black Bear Management Plan, R657-33 Amendments, 2023 Recommendations

- Public Questions / Comment:
 - How many complaints are actually coming in unsolicited?
 - Trish Hedin, Grand County- Supports hounds for bear management. Supports committee process. However, has seen egregious actions by the William Wood case. Mr. Wood did not get a felony; he was convicted on 2 misdemeanors. We need to deal with bad apples or we will lose our sport. Referenced letter from Grand County. Clean up definition ("at bay"). 16 hounds are bad optics. Let's reduce out of state of hunter privileges.
 - Corey Huntsman- Utah Houndsmen- You don't release all 16 dogs all at once. You bring in fresh dogs and take out tired dogs. The Wood video is sickening to watch. He was a bad apple.
 - Cody Webster- The video does not represent houndsmen. Too many dogs will result in the bear running longer and not treeing. Reducing dog numbers won't result in less chase. Please approve DWR's recommendations.
 - Guy Webster- You don't ask other hunters/fishermen if they have complaints against other user groups and types of hunters. Unsuccessful prosecutions happen. There aren't many successful prosecutions. Houndsmen are more upset by the Wood case than anyone else.
- RAC Questions / Comments:
 - Please talk about the elimination of the fall baiting season
 - Can you go over what DWR has already done to address hounds. What restrictions were approved a few years ago?
 - How many complaints do we have in recent years, since we made the changes? Who are those complaints coming from?
 - Feels like the measures we have taken the last few years, since the William Wood's case, have improved things.
 - Communication goal- How will you communicate to the public about pack sizes and why 16 is sometimes necessary?
 - Have there been issues in Utah with bait stations using chocolate? Was that a recommendation from DWR?
 - With moving the fall chase season into August, was there concern that the heat would reduce their season length?
 - Can you elaborate on the 55-gallon container for baiting?
 - What is the Forest Service concerns with containers?
 - Registering bait stations- what has changed?
 - Is there any data that shows that running bears reduces fat reserves and affects survival in the fall?
 - Is there any data that indicates how many of the complaints are about non-residents?
 - Currently, who needs a permit with dogs?
 - One recommendation is for everyone to have a pursuit permit? Can DWR require that but still have hunters take their kids with them? Is that enforceable?
 - Sometimes larger pack sizes are necessary for training purposes.

- Travis ONeil- couldn't be here but Eric Luke read a statement that said- Fall bait season went away to give more people an opportunity. Commented on chocolate ban
- Sunshine Brosi- lots of states ban grain, apples, grease, etc. The chocolate recommendation was a compromise.
- Eric Luke- needs some verbiage changed in the law to help prosecutors. Is concerned with verbiage in the letter. Would it be appropriate to make a motion that asks you to work with the Grand County attorney to come up with better verbiage that protects the sport but helps with prosecution.
- Kyle Maynard- committed to working with the Grand County attorney.
- Eric Luke- Why are we allowing non-residents to come into Utah and jeopardize the sport? Let's look at getting rid of non-resident pursuit permits altogether. Feels like the changes that have been made in the last 3 years addresses most of the concerns outlined in the Grand County letter.
- Kyle Maynard- Eliminating out of state permits opens up opportunities for litigation because it could violate federal laws.
- Charles Fischer- Christina Sloan is in office only until the end of the year. If you work with the new prosecutor, please also bring in Christina and her knowledge.
- Scott Flannery- Not fair to lump all non-residents in this category.
- Steve Duke- Non-residents coming to train dogs should have Special Use Permit
- Darren Olsen- Can the USFS have input on bear bait locations? Can you share the map with USFS?
- Kirk Player- How can the Utah USFS allow containers. Containers have less of an environmental impact. Let's not have houndsmen laws/rules created by people who aren't houndsmen.
- Kent- What would an ethics course look like? Is that something that the Houndsmen would support?
- Darren- Making the course required didn't make a difference with harvest. Requirement isn't necessary.
- Corey Huntsmen- Not opposed to an ethics course about pursuit.
- Sunshine- Containers would help hunters differentiate between males and females because they can see relative size.
- Kevin Albrecht- DWR LE should work with USFS LE and check whether people have a Special Use Permit.
- Eric Luke- Does USFS have a LE officer in the Grand/San Juan area?
- Kevin Albrecht- Even if USFS LE is not present, DWR can work with USFS to check Special Use Permits.
- Dana Truman- Let's discuss pack size. 16 vs 8.
- Kirk Player- We should listen to the houndsmen who understand this issue better.
- Sunshine Brosi- We should consider the optics.
- Eric Luke- agrees with the current 16 dog restriction. Outreach efforts will help the public understand the reason. Video was hard to watch but that's not normal
- Dana Truman- What are the other states' dog restrictions?
- Corey Huntsmen- Only Colorado has dog restrictions.
- Kirk Player- The solution to prevent future Wood cases is for the attorneys to work together and strengthen language.
- Eric Luke- Do we need to make a motion for Kyle to work with Grand Canyon attorney to look at changing the verbiage?

 - Jerry Swasey, Utah Trappers- recommends that non-residents have a trapping license and take the fur harvesters' class. Other states require it so we should do the same.
